WCR Updates

True, we haven't had a newsletter since the May/June issue! WCR sure has been busy! Weekly, we are currently serving 53 participants in the Horsemanship program and about 20 clients in our Mental Health Therapy



program. Two new PATH Intl. certified instructors were hired in August to help alleviate the Horsemanship waiting list.

Our next Horsemanship program runs October 11 through November 4. Then, Wisconsin weather permitting, we have a two-week session from November 8 through 19. Because of the cold weather, unheated arena, holidays, and to give our horses a well-deserved break, the Horsemanship program closes November 22 until spring. However, volunteers can still be a part of WCR during our off time to help with chores and property care. Our Mental Health Therapy program continues through the winter.

<u>On the News and In the News -</u> We have had a lot of surprises this summer with unexpected phone calls! In late June, WCR received an unexpected message from a lady that wanted to visit and take pictures of our horses. Kym McDaniel is an independent filmmaker, originally from Milwaukee and now living in Central New York. Her own journey of healing was impacted by interaction with horses, and she was compelled to create a video for WCR after being touched by our story.
